- 9 I'd like to turn to the Prosecution and ask whether you have any question in

- 23 listen to what Ms Naouri has to say in objection, please.
- 24 Yes, Ms Naouri.
- 25 MS NAOURI: [9:56:01](Interpretation) I'm grateful, your Honour. Yes, we enter

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- 1 the objection here in this re-examination question or line of questions because this
- 2 document is part of his written statement that bears upon the account of what
- 3 happened to the witness. The Prosecution decided not to return to these matters in
- 4 his -- in its in-chief. So this material is simply -- during the cross-examination,
- 5 forgive me. This is material that cropped up in the in-chief. So, once again, to
- 6 circumvent the procedure, to go back in re-examination on matters that were
- 7 addressed by the Prosecution during the examination-in-chief but elected not to -- not
- 8 to address in detail by, for example, showing that written chronology written by the
- 9 witness to the witness, so therefore we enter an objection to this line of reason and
- 10 this approach. And there it is, your Honour.
- 11 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:57:03] Ms Naouri, what we are going to do is
- 12 to -- out of curiosity, I am going to allow counsel, because I don't know the question
- she wants to put. I also want to deal with that document. So let's allow her.
- 14 And, Mr Witness, I'm going to ask of you to listen, but do not answer after counsel
- would have put her question until I tell you to do so, so I see whether or not it's a
- 16 question fit for re-examination. Thank you very much.
- 17 Counsel, Madam Prosecutor, put the question. Let me hear you.
- 18 MS MAKWAIA: [9:57:41] Thank you, your Honours.
- 19 Q. [9:57:44] Mr Witness, you have given evidence on 12 and 13 October to the
- 20 Court. Can you tell us what is this evidence based on.
- 21 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:57:59] Excuse me, Ms Makwaia, and sorry if I
- 22 mispronounce your name, actually. Am I correct in pronouncing Ms Makwaia?
- 23 MS MAKWAIA: [9:58:11] You are correct, Madam President.

- 25 What do you mean "what is this evidence based on"? Evidence, are you talking

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- about the chronology of events that the witness put before the Court, as in tab 6,

- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:58:33] Well, no, you are supposed to ask questions
- 5 that are new, things that came up fresh in cross-examination.

- 7 chronology of events.
- 8 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:58:47] You can move away from it, but whatever
- 9 question you want to ask, as you know, I'm sure you know, must be something that

- 5 that is in fact the document -- or those are the documents you are talking about.
- 6 Madam Court Clerk, can you take the originals of those documents to the witness,
- 7 please. Yes.
- 8 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:01:23] Just for the record, your Honours, the documents
- 9 that are currently presented to the witness was CAR-OTP-2130-6658, 6659, 6660, 6661,
- 10 6662 and 6663, redacted 01. Thank you.
- 11 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:01:42] Thank you very much.
- 12 Are those the documents you gave to the investigators of the Office of the Prosecutor
- of the ICC, Mr Witness?
- 14 THE WITNESS: [10:02:06](Interpretation) Yes, what you are saying is accurate. It's
- 15 the same document.
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:02:12] Thank you very much.
- 17 Mr Court Clerk, can we ask kindly that you retrieve those documents that will stay
- 18 with the Registry.
- 19 MS NAOURI: [10:02:22](Interpretation) Your Honour, excuse me. Sorry. If we
- 20 could perhaps during the break, if we could also analyse the originals because the
- 21 Defence team hasn't seen them as yet. If it's possible.
- 22 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:02:40] Yes. That's very possible and, really, the
- 23 right thing to do. You can look at it because it was with the Office of the Prosecutor.
- 24 It's the same document that we saw, but it's fine for you to see it in its original form.

25 Thank you.

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- 1 Mr Witness, you told us yesterday that -- rather, you suggested that Mr Said was not
- 2 someone who was unknown during the period concerned in the Central African
- 3 Republic. You said he could rather be recognised. Even though you said you did
- 4 not know him at that point in time, could you tell us why you would say he was
- 5 somebody who could be easily recognised or why he was known, a known individual.
- 6 Thank you.
- 7 THE WITNESS: [10:03:52](Interpretation) I said that Mr Said was a rather prominent
- 8 figure for the only reason -- for the simple reason is that the day we were arrested at
- 9 the OCRB Ngouciment, and when he arrived at the OCRB, most of my relatives, who
- were Muslims, started speaking his name, and they recognised him.
- 11 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:04:26] Okay. Thank you very much.
- 12 And I'd also want to refer you to the testimony of -- in T-20, that transcript of T-20,
- where you say that, you know, when you were arrested at your cousin's funeral,
- 14 (Redacted), you said the commander of the OCRB Ngouciment informed you that a
- 15 well-known and dangerous person in your group was in cahoots with the
- 16 President Bozizé.
- 17 Now, that person who you referred to as a "dangerous person" -- we're in closed
- 18 session, are we, Madam Court Officer?
- 19 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:05:29] We are still in private session, yes,
- 20 Madam President.
- 21 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:05:33] Yes.
- 22 Mr Witness, we are in private session. So the person who you say was referred to as
- 23 a dangerous person and a cohort of the President Bozizé, can you tell us the name of
- 24 that person. We have a name, but we may be mistaken. So give us the name now

25 that we're in private session.

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1 THE WITNESS: [10:06:05](Interpretation) In the beginning, when the commander of

- 2 this unit made that statement, I did not know who amongst us was in cahoots with
- 3 Mr Bozizé, and this came as a surprise. What came as a surprise was, when

- waiting for the end to see if we could have the original of this document. So thank
- 12 you for suggesting it right from now. Thank you.
- 13 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:10:55] Madam Court Officer, can you get the
- document to Ms Naouri, please, while we deal with the other questions.
- 15 I'll now pass the microphone over to my colleague to put questions or a question to
- 16 the witness.
- 17 Judge Ugalde, please.
- 18 Oh, a question to the Prosecution. Thank you.
- 19 JUDGE UGALDE: [10:11:27] Thank you, Madam President.
- 20 Concerning this document that the witness has recognised to have been written by
- 21 him and handed over to the Prosecution, I want to ask you about what has been
- 22 introduced in eCourt. Because if you see tabs 6, 7, 8 and 9, they all appear to be
- 23 photographs of the document. However, tab 10 and 11 appear to be photocopies of
- 24 the photograph of that document. And I say "appear to be" because we saw the
- original this morning, at least for tab 10, and we could see that the original is actually

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- a photograph, but in the tab it looks like a photocopy of that photograph.
- 2 I just wanted to ask you whether you know whether what was presented to us is
- 3 indeed a photocopy of that photograph, or whether there is any other reason why we
- 4 see a black and white display of this document rather than the, say, original blue
- 5 colour that the document was written, the pen was written in blue, or the pen used
- 6 was in blue.
- 7 So I just want to get a sense whether -- why is there such a difference between what
- 8 actually -- the actual document is and what is presented to us? If you have an
- 9 explanation, I will appreciate it. Thank you.
- 10 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:13:57] For the record, Judge Ugalde refers to the item
- 11 CAR-OTP-2130-6662-R01. It's visible on evidence channel 1.
- 12 MS MAKWAIA: [10:14:12] Thank you for that question, your Honour.
- 13 There is no particular reason at all as to why the ones you stated appear to be copies
- of a photograph, your Honour. The -- it was simply the way the production team
- 15 produced these documents.
- 16 The original documents, as you have seen, are in blue, and then there's two additional
- separate sheets in white, also written in blue. So there is really no particular reason.
- 18 It's just the way they produced them.
- 19 And further to that, your Honour, it's very faint. For example, annex D6, there is a
- 20 part missing. This is why I then requested for the original to be taken from the vault
- 21 so that it could be available for inspection. Thank you. I hope I've answered your
- 22 question.
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:15:20] Thank you very much, Madam Prosecutor.
- 24 Well, I'd want to thank you, Counsel, Madam Prosecutor, and of course, Ms Pellet
- and Ms Naouri, for these proceedings so far, including the testimony of this witness.

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- 1 And, Mr Witness, on behalf of the Court, and indeed on behalf of this Chamber, we
- 2 wish to thank you for your assistance to the Court. We wish you well in your future
