- 22 For the Prosecution this morning, myself, Ms Makwaia, senior trial lawyer; Ms Leonie
- 23 von Braun, trial lawyer; Ms Brunhild Le Bailly, associate trial lawyer; and Ms Adeline
- 24 *Belle, associate trial lawyer. Thank you.
- 25 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:37:15] Thank you very much, Ms Makwaia.

- 1 Ms Pellet for the victims, please.
- 2 MS PELLET: [9:37:23](Interpretation) Thank you, your Honour.
- 3 The victims are today represented by Tars Van Litsenborgh and myself, *Sarah Pellet,
- 4 Counsel within the Office of Public Counsel for Victims. Thank you.
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:37:38] Thank you, Ms Pellet.
- 6 Can I ask Ms Naouri to introduce the team for the Defence, please.
- 7 MS NAOURI: [9:37:51](Interpretation) Thank you, your Honour. Good morning.
- 8 I have Dov Jacobs. I also have Manon Lanselle. * Capucine Banet and Elina Legat
- 9 are behind me. And my name is Jennifer Naouri, chief counsel. Thank you.
- 10 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:38:08] Thank you very much, Ms Naouri.
- 11 And for the record, I note that Mr Said is in court.
- 12 A very good morning to you, Mr Said.
- 13 MR SAID: [9:38:19](Interpretation) Good morning, your Honour.
- 14 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [9:38:24] Good morning.
- We have two oral decisions to issue before we commence today's proceedings, the
- one in respect of the Rule 68(3) request by the Prosecution for P-2931.
- 17 The Chamber will render this short decision to introduce the annex to P-2931's
- preparation log under Rule 68(3) of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence. And for
- 19 the record, the request is filing number 585.
- 20 The Chamber received the Prosecution's request on Monday, 16 January. The
- 21 Defence submitted a written response to the Prosecution's request on Tuesday,
- 22 17 January. And for the record, the response is filing number 587.
- 23 The annex contains corrections and clarifications to P-2931's prior recorded testimony,
- 24 whose introduction via Rule 68(3) the Chamber already granted. The annex also
- 25 contains additional information in that the witness was asked to comment on

documents and photographs shown to him during the witness preparation session.

- 2 The Prosecution submits that the annex bears sufficient indicia of reliability, is
- 3 relevant and probative and that its introduction would expedite the proceedings.
- 4 In addition, the Prosecution requests leave to add four items to its list of evidence.
- 5 These items were shown to the witness during his witness preparation session and
- 6 comprise three photographs annotated by the witness and an identity card.
- 7 In its response to the Prosecution's request, the Defence objects to the introduction of
- 8 the annex pursuant to Rule 68(3) of the Rules of Procedure and Evidence. First, the
- 9 Defence submits that the existence of corrections and additions to prior recorded
- 10 testimony means that the only way of proceeding is to discuss these with the witness
- in the hearing. In this regard, the Defence notes that there is no control over the
- manner in which the annex is prepared and there is no verbatim transcript, so there is
- 13 no way to know what questions were put or asked and the manner of such
- 14 questioning.
- 15 Furthermore, the Defence notes that the use of Rule 68(3) reduces the level of judicial
- 16 control over the process and that it is for the Prosecution to clarify contradictions
- between a previous statement and the preparation log so that the Defence can
- 18 respond in full knowledge of the facts presented.
- 19 The Defence submits that this is particularly pertinent given the contradictions and
- additions in P-2931's preparation log compared to his earlier statement, particularly in
- 21 respect of the nature of his relationships with other individuals and the dates and
- 22 chronology of his alleged detention at the OCRB. In this regard, the Defence submits
- 23 that the witness's statement must be tested in court before the Chamber.
- 24 Last, the Defence avers that the fact that the witness will be available for
- 25 cross-examination cannot be used to justify the introduction of the annex because it

1 would transform Rule 68(3) into the automatic introduction of all witness preparation

- 2 logs, which is not the intention of the drafters of Rule 68(3).
- 3 Now, at the outset, the Chamber takes into account the content of the annex and does
- 4 not find that the Defence would suffer prejudice if the annex were to be introduced
- 5 pursuant to Rule 68(3). In this regard, the Chamber finds that the additions and
- 6 clarifications are not of such a nature or degree that would preclude the introduction
- 7 of the annex. In any event, the Chamber recalls that the Defence will be afforded
- 8 reasonable time to raise issues it considers relevant during its questioning of P-2931,
- 9 including the reasons behind the corrections and clarifications contained in the annex
- 10 to the preparation log. Accordingly, the Chamber finds that the introduction of the
- annex of P-2931's preparation log does not unduly infringe upon the rights of the
- 12 accused and does not prejudice the Defence. The Chamber therefore authorises its
- 13 introduction under Rule 68(3) of the Rules.
- 14 In respect of the four items which the Prosecution requests addition to its list of
- 15 evidence. The Chamber notes that in respect of the three photographs annotated by
- 16 the witness, the Defence does not object to their addition, noting that the originals
- already appear on the Prosecution's list of evidence, and indeed two have already
- 18 been deemed formally submitted by the Chamber. Accordingly, the Chamber grants
- 19 the Prosecution's request to add these items to its list of evidence.
- 20 In respect of the identity card, which bears the ERN number CAR-OTP-2128-0747, the
- 21 Defence objects to its addition to the list of evidence, noting that the Prosecution has
- 22 had this item since 13 October 2020 and did not retain it as evidence during the
- 23 confirmation hearing in October 2021. Furthermore, the Defence submits that
- 24 disclosure of the item in question does not in and of itself justify its late inclusion to
- 25 the list of evidence, particularly given how long the Prosecution has had this item in

- 1 its possession.
- 2 The Chamber notes that the item in question relates to an identity card of an
- 3 individual who features prominently in P-2931's prior recorded testimony and was
- 4 disclosed to the Defence on 7 July 2021. Whilst the Chamber acknowledges the
- 5 Defence's submissions regarding the lateness of this request, the Chamber finds that
- 6 the item in limited in scope, has been in the Defence's possession for a significant
- 7 period of time, and that the Defence is free to question the witness on this particular
- 8 item if it chooses. Accordingly, the Chamber finds that it would not be unduly
- 9 prejudicial to the Defence to add the item to the Prosecution's list of evidence and
- allows the Prosecution to add CAR-OTP-2128-0747 to its list of evidence. The
- 11 Prosecution is ordered to file an updated list of evidence in line with the present
- 12 decision.
- Now, this concludes the Chamber's oral decision in respect of the Rule 68(3) request
- 14 by the Prosecution.
- 15 Turning to the next oral decision, the Chamber notes that the Defence has submitted a
- 16 request to lift certain redactions. I'll ask the court officer to get us into private

- 2 Q. [10:26:07] And your name, is it on the first line or the second line?
- 3 A. [10:26:23] My name is at the bottom of this document.
- 4 Q. [10:26:42] And --
- 5 THE INTERPRETER: [10:26:48] Witness continues.
- 6 MS LE BAILLY: [10:26:53](Interpretation)
- 7 Q. [10:26:54] Very well. And is your name the first name we see at the bottom of
- 8 this page, on the first line or the second line, the second name that we see at the
- 9 bottom of the -- of the document?
- 10 A. [10:27:13] Would you mind scrolling down a little bit. That would help me see
- 11 it better. Or perhaps scroll it up a bit.
- 12 Q. [10:27:34] Well, perhaps we can zoom in more, once again homing in on those
- 13 names and signatures.
- 14 A. [10:27:50] I can see my name written in blue ink on the first line. That is indeed
- 15 my name.
- 16 Q. [10:28:01] Very well, Mr Witness.
- 17 Now I would like to bring up another page, ERN 2264, if that would be possible.
- 18 Mr Witness, do you recognise that signature that is displayed here?
- 19 A. [10:28:39] Yes, I recognise, recognise it perfectly. This is my signature. It has
- 20 my name's initials in it. And this was on 10 February 2022 in the centre of town.
- 21 Q. [10:29:05] Very well. So is this the second statement that you gave to the OTP
- 22 investigators on that, therefore on 10 February 2022?
- 23 A. [10:29:23] Yes, that's right.
- 24 Q. [10:29:29] Very well. Thank you.
- 25 Your Honour, honourable members of the bench, in light of your decision, your oral

- decision going to our motion, I will now continue with the additional procedural
- 2 requirements.
- Witness, before appearing before the Court to testify today, did you have the
- 4 opportunity to reread and review your statement during a preparatory session with
- 5 the Office of the Prosecutor via video link?
- 6 A. [10:30:17] Yes, I had the opportunity to do so with them. They gave me the
- 7 opportunity to look at my statement via video.
- 8 Q. [10:30:33] And during this preparatory session did you have the opportunity to
- 9 make corrections thereto or to make clarifications with regard to your previous
- 10 statement?
- 11 A. [10:30:53] Yes, indeed, I made certain corrections and clarifications thereto. I
- 12 recognise that. Because I swore an oath to tell the truth.
- 13 Q. [10:31:10] Very well. I would now like to show you a document and I'd like to
- 14 ask you once again if you recognise it.
- 15 Court officer, could you show the document on tab 25 of the list, confidential list,
- 16 ERN CAR-OTP-00000802.
- 17 Could we just go up to the very top of the page to see the title of the page. Thank
- 18 you.
- 19 Witness, do you see -- can you read this document?
- 20 A. [10:32:17] I can see the document. I can see it well. I can read it well and I
- 21 recognise it. It's the document which was drawn up during the preparatory session
- 22 for my statement.
- 23 Q. [10:32:38] Very well.
- I would now like to ask that page 5 is shown, 00005, of the same document. Could
- 25 we zoom in a bit more to the bottom of the document and the signature. Thank you.

- 1 Witness, do you recognise the signature?
- 2 A. [10:33:27] Yes, I recognise the signature. I recognise it because I used a pen and
- 3 made -- or I used a marker and did it on a tactile screen -- a tactile keyboard.
- 4 THE INTERPRETER: [10:33:58] Corrects the interpreter.
- 5 MS LE BAILLY: [10:34:01](Interpretation)
- 6 Q. [10:34:01] Witness, so these are the corrections and clarifications that you made
- 7 to the Office of the Prosecutor on 13 January 2023?
- 8 A. [10:34:25] Yes, it is indeed that.
- 9 Q. [10:34:30] Very well.
- 10 Witness, we've now noted your corrections and clarifications, in addition to your two
- statements, your two previous statements. I would therefore like to know, to the
- 12 best of your knowledge and awareness, when you provided all this -- when you
- provided all this statement, did you do it to the best of your knowledge and memory?
- 14 A. [10:35:01] I said all the truth, indeed.
- 15 Q. [10:35:08] Very well.
- And to finish with my examination-in-chief, I just have two more questions to put to
- 17 you before the Court.
- 18 Taking into account all your corrections and clarifications once again, I would like to
- 19 know if you are in agreement that the judges use your two previous statements that
- 20 we've just seen together as evidence in this case?
- 21 A. [10:36:03] Would you allow me to put a question to you?
- 22 Q. [10:36:08] Yes, of course.
- 23 A. [10:36:15] As in February, my statement was taken in January 2023, and once
- 24 again my statement was taken again. But for the proper functioning of justice, if the
- 25 two statements are to be useful, then it causes no problem for me whatsoever. If

- 1 they are to be used as evidence in this case, it would pose absolutely no problem to
- 2 me whatsoever.
- 3 Q. [10:37:14] So I note that there's no problem with the judges using your previous
- 4 statements, both of them, and it's no problem for them, therefore, to use your
- 5 corrections and clarifications, the corrections and clarifications which we made in
- 6 January 2023 during the preparatory session.
- 7 A. [10:37:47] I have no problem with that whatsoever.
- 8 Q. [10:37:51] Very well.
- 9 So my last question is a bit repetitive, but it's a procedural question. Would you
- 10 have any objection to us using all of your documents?
- 11 A. [10:38:23] I think the decision doesn't come from me. You asked me to give an
- 12 account of what I experienced and what I know. So my motivation was to give my
- statement and if it is to be used for the purposes of justice I have absolutely no
- 14 problem with that.
- 15 Q. [10:38:49] Very well. I'd like to thank you, Witness, for your testimony. I
- 16 have finished with my questions and I now turn towards Madam President.
- 17 Your Honours, if that satisfies your procedural requirements under 68(3) without any
- 18 other instructions from you.
- 19 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:39:14] Thank you very much, Madam Prosecutor.
- 20 We confirm that we deem -- we deem that the requirements of Rule 68(3) are satisfied.
- 21 So we will now call on Ms Pellet for the victims to put questions to this witness,
- 22 please.
- 23 MS PELLET: [10:39:39](Interpretation) Thank you, your Honour. I would just
- crave your indulgence for a minute such that I can get the lectern.
- 25 Thank you, Madam President.

- 1 I maintain my request that in accordance with your * decision on the Conduct of
- 2 Proceedings, and because my colleague from the Prosecution has just satisfied the
- 3 requirements of Rule 68(3), I will limit my questions to the harm suffered by the
- 4 witness during the events of 2013 and the impact of these events on his life and that of
- 5 his family.
- 6 QUESTIONED BY MS PELLET: (Interpretation)
- 7 Q. [10:40:42] Good morning, Witness.
- 8 A. [10:40:45] Good morning, Counsel.
- 9 Q. [10:40:49] We know each other, but for the purpose of the transcript * I would
- 10 like to specify that I am your legal representative because you were authorised to
- participate in the proceedings on 27 May on the basis of a form that we filled in
- together on 10 February 2022 via video link and telephone, when the network didn't
- allow us to continue with the video link.
- 14 So you were in the office of *Maître* Bekoy. Could you confirm that, please, this
- 15 information.
- 16 A. [10:41:35] * Yes, I confirm that, indeed we know each other and we had
- discussions together when I was in the office of *Maître* Dibert-Bekoy. We did it by
- 18 video link and by phone.
- 19 Q. [10:42:00] Thank you, Witness.
- 20 Your Honour, I would now like to refer to our submissions in paragraph 30 and 31
- 21 thereof, ICC-01/14-01/21-518.
- Witness, do you still think back to the events which led to your victimisation in
- 23 2013?
- A. [10:42:48] Yes, I still remember what happened to me in 2013.
- 25 Q. [10:43:03] And how do you feel when you think back to these events?

- 1 A. [10:43:30] When I remember that, well, a long time ago I was very afraid, but the
- 2 conditions are no longer the same. The context is no longer the same. To a certain
- 3 extent, I've been able to overcome certain difficulties and I'm trying to find peace
- 4 within myself.
- 5 Q. [10:43:57] Thank you, Witness.
- 6 Do you still have nightmares?
- 7 A. [10:44:19] No. I no longer have nightmares like before, because my life is
- 8 improving positively with the help that I'm receiving.
- 9 Q. [10:44:34] And what help is that, Witness?
- 10 A. [10:44:48] I think the fact that I am before justice and the fact that I discuss with
- 11 lawyers, Madam Sarah gives me advice. The Office of the Prosecutor gives me
- something to survive with and that gives me less stress and it improves my general
- 13 condition.
- 14 Q. [10:45:21] * Mr. Witness, did you benefit at any time, since your release in 2013,
- 15 from psychological treatment?
- 16 A. [10:45:49] I had the possibility through the advice that was given by the elders
- or the experts who were working in the area of trauma, post-traumatic stress
- 18 syndrome. I participated in certain workshops, seminars, and that was certainly
- 19 beneficial for me.
- 20 Q. [10:46:22] Thank you very much, Witness.
- 21 In your statement to the Office of the Prosecutor, you indicated that at the time of
- 22 your arrest you were a student; is that correct?
- 23 A. [10:46:48] That's correct, I was a student. I was in -- when these people, these
- 24 wrongdoers came to the house, I was no longer sleeping. I was carrying out
- 25 different exercises. And at that time I was a student. I was learning.

- 1 Q. [10:47:16] Did you have another activity that you were carrying out, another
- 2 activity which would generate revenue at the time of your arrest?
- 3 A. [10:47:35] * At that time I was a student and I had some income-generating
- 4 activities when I went home. I used to sell different articles, pharmaceutical products
- 5 from a small kiosk, and that made it possible for me to buy periodicals and books, to
- 6 facilitate my studies.
- 7 Q. [10:48:14] I'm sorry, I'm going back to your status as a student. Have you been able
- 8 to go back to your studies, or were you able to go back to your studies after your arrest?
- 9 A. [10:48:37] After my arrest and after I was freed, the conditions, the living
- 10 conditions were not good. What I tried to do was to get employment. And, thank
- God, I managed to find employment, a job which I still hold to this day.
- 12 Q. [10:49:03] Thank you, Witness.
- Now, you indicated previously that at the time of your arrest you were selling
- 14 different articles in a kiosk. So what happened to your stock after your arrest?
- 15 A. [10:49:36] I think I lost everything. I lost all the stock that I had. I said that I
- 16 was selling pharmaceutical products, different articles such as clothing. And when I
- tell you that I lost everything, that's because when I was arrested by these criminals I
- 18 was asked to wash shoes or clean shoes, and I saw that these were articles that I was
- 19 selling. I noted that they had pillaged my kiosk, my shop. So when I was freed, I
- 20 had nothing to do and I decided to go into the provinces on (Redacted).
- 21 Q. [10:50:33] Thank you, Witness.
- Who are you referring to when you say "they" pillaged everything?
- 23 A. [10:50:48] Here I'm referring to those people who smashed down our door and
- 24 arrested me. I'm clearly speaking about the Seleka.
- 25 Q. [10:51:02] Thank you, Witness.

- 1 You've just indicated that after your arrest you fled into the provinces. And was it
- 2 *of your own will?
- 3 A. [10:51:32] No, it wasn't of my own will. It's not what I wanted to do, not at all.
- 4 Because when I was freed and my older brother was buried --
- 5 *MS PELLET: [10:51:53](Interpretation) Your Honour, with a view to security, I
- 6 would ask that we go into private session for this answer.
- 7 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:52:01] Madam Court Officer, can we go into
- 8 private session, please.
- 9 (Private session at 10.52 a.m.)
- 10 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:52:19] We're in private session, your Honours.

- 20 interrupted, I was saying the following: * I didn't go of my own volition, because of
- 21 what I experienced, my parents wanted to protect me. And it was for this reason
- 22 that they gave me some money to pay for the transport in order for me to take refuge
- 23 in the provinces. So I left with nothing.
- 24 Q. [10:53:59] Thank you, Witness.
- 25 And do you feel safe now, Witness?

- 1 A. [10:54:22] * What I can say by way of answer to that, I see that the State
- 2 authorities, the defense and security forces, and the judiciary are working and that
- 3 gives me a certain assurance, a relative degree of security. But where it concerns me
- 4 myself, I don't know. I'm a human being. I can't reply. I can't answer that.
- 5 Q. [10:54:57] Thank you.
- 6 Witness, what do you expect from the trial of Mr Said?
- 7 *A. [10:55:21] As far as I know, I never knew who Mr Said was, and it is up to
- 8 justice to decide what happens next.
- 9 MS PELLET: [10:55:42](Interpretation) Thank you, Mr. Witness. Madam President. I
- 10 have finished with my questions.
- 11 PRESIDING JUDGE SAMBA: [10:55:49] Thank you very much, Ms Pellet.
- 12 Ms Naouri for the Defence, I see we have five minutes before the break. We could as
- well take an early break and come back at 11.25, if that's fine for you.
