- 7 and the paragraph number is 57. Therein it states:
- 8 "The investigators told me that they were going to show me pictures of individuals.
- 9 They explained to me that they were going to show one picture at a time. They told
- 10 me that each image had a unique registration number. They said that the series of
- images may or may not contain images of people I referred to in my statement. They
- told me to take the time to take a good look at the footage before commenting."
- 13 And in relation --
- 14 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [9:59:14](No interpretation)
- 15 MS SUTHERLAND: [9:59:24] My apologies to the interpreters.
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [9:59:49](Interpretation) Thank you. I believe that
- all parties have understood that the interpretation is being provided consecutively,
- 18 not simultaneously. So please let's bear that in mind.
- 19 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:00:23] Is there Songhaï interpretation?
- 20 THE SONGHAÏ INTERPRETER: [10:00:34](Interpretation) Message from the
- 21 Songhaï interpreters: Could the Presiding Judge please then recall that what the
- 22 French booth has said is that the English should be slowed down, that counsel should
- 23 slow down, and that all in the courtroom should be mindful of the fact that
- 24 interpretation is being done consecutively. Thank you.
- 25 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:01:09](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland, please

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- 1 proceed.
- 2 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:01:11] If I could ask the Songhaï booth, do they wish for me
- 3 to repeat the last paragraph?
- 4 THE SONGHAÏ INTERPRETER: [10:01:24](Interpretation) Yes, please.
- 5 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:01:26] Referring to Prosecution tab 1,
- 6 MLI-OTP-0070-1598-R02 at page 1610, paragraph 57:
- 7 "The investigators told me that they were going to show me pictures of individuals.
- 8 They explained to me that they were going to show one picture at a time. They told
- 9 me that each image had a unique registration number. They said that the series of
- 10 images may or may not contain images of people I referred to in my statement. They
- told me to take the time to take a good look at the footage before commenting."
- 12 And in relation to photograph MLI-OTP-0022-0471, the statement reads:
- 13 "The person in the picture looks like Al Hassan. When he came for the television, it
- 14 was night; but he looked like this. His face was revealed and there was light.
- 15 When he drove by I couldn't make out his features well."
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:04:12](Interpretation) Madam Prosecutor.
- 17 MS HUCK: [10:04:13](Interpretation) Your Honour, the Defence read a translation of
- 18 the statement which was in -- originally in French. Her English was then translated
- into French by the interpreter here and it's not exactly what it cites in the French
- original, particularly the penultimate sentence. Perhaps it would be a good idea to
- 21 read the whole thing in French so that it goes from the original French to Songhaï
- 22 without having been through the English version, which has a different
- 23 interpretation.
- 24 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:05:02](Interpretation) Very well. Because
- 25 during the translation things can indeed get lost and it may be different.

- WITNESS: MLI-OTP-P-0984
- 1 Now who is going to read this, who is going to read the text in French?
- 2 THE INTERPRETER: [10:05:27] Message from the English booth: Please could the
- 3 Prosecutor remove her mask when speaking.
- 4 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:05:34] Mr President, it seems to me, given that I've given
- 5 the precise references and the interpreters have been provided with all of this material,
- 6 that it would make sense for the interpreters to read directly from the text.
- 7 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:05:57](Interpretation) Very well. We have the
- 8 text in the file. Ms Sutherland, you can give the exact reference to the French
- 9 interpreters so that they can read the text, please.
- 10 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:06:13] For the benefit of the interpreters' booth, the
- reference is Prosecution tab 1, and the document is MLI-OTP-0070-1598-R02 at
- page 1610, and the paragraph number is 57. There's an introductory paragraph and
- then we'll go to the box which relates specifically to this photograph.
- 14 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:07:01] (Interpretation) I will also inform the Chamber
- that paragraph 57 is available on evidence channel 1.
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:07:19](Interpretation) Yes, it is. Please read the
- 17 reference in the box relating to the document ending in 0471.
- 18 (Text read by the French interpreter)
- 19 THE WITNESS: [10:08:25](Interpretation) Very well.
- 20 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:08:27]
- 21 Q. [10:08:28] And, Mr Witness, you were shown this photograph again during the
- 22 witness preparation session. And I refer now to Defence tab 10, the number is
- 23 MLI-OTP-0077-3953, at page 3956, and at the first row in the last column.
- 24 Has that been interpreted to the witness?
- 25 So in that last --

- WITNESS: MLI-OTP-P-0984
- 1 A. [10:10:27] Yes, I was shown this.
- 2 Q. [10:10:36] In the last column of the first row the comment reads:
- 3 "[The witness] viewed the image from the binder instead of [...] Webex due to
- 4 technical problems. After the comment was read to him [the witness] stated he
- 5 knew the person and it was the same person who came when they came that night for
- 6 the television. [There was] No further clarification."
- 7 A. [10:11:44] Yes, I said that the photo you showed me resembled Al Hassan and
- 8 that it was at nighttime.
- 9 Q. [10:12:03] Mr Witness, do you confirm that this is the person who came to tell
- 10 you to switch off your television?
- 11 A. [10:12:38] Yes, as I said, he looks like Al Hassan. It was night. And if you
- 12 look closely, it looks like Al Hassan.
- 13 Q. [10:12:56] Mr Witness, do you also confirm --
- 14 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:13:00](Interpretation) Mr Prosecutor.
- 15 MR DUTERTRE: [10:13:02](Interpretation) I don't want to interrupt, but could the
- Defence please explain a bit this story of a television. It's a little bit cryptic and I'm
- 17 not sure here in the courtroom we're understanding what this refers to. It would
- perhaps be good to have questions on that topic.
- 19 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:13:33](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland.
- 20 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:13:33] The Prosecution asked me to establish the basis for
- 21 showing that specific photograph. I have done that. I have gone through two
- 22 documents that were Prosecution documents. The fact that the witness didn't -- the
- 23 information about this was not elicited by the Prosecution yesterday is a matter for
- 24 them. Now we are really -- I was hoping that we would have a relatively swift
- 25 cross-examination. Now we're in the territory of being really dragged down by,

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- 1 I would -- unnecessary objections.
- 2 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:14:17](Interpretation) Mr Prosecutor, I agree
- 3 entirely with the Defence. If we've come to this television story, it's because you
- 4 asked for the basis to be established.
- 5 Ms Sutherland, please do proceed.
- 6 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:14:32] Thank you, Mr President.
- 7 Q. [10:14:34] Mr Witness, do you confirm that you have never been to the BMS?
- 8 A. [10:15:04] I was never there. I never went to the BMS.
- 9 Q. [10:15:12] Mr Witness, yesterday you told us that you had never seen any public
- 10 punishments; is that correct?
- 11 A. [10:15:49] That's true. I was never there. I never went to any of the places
- where they gave these punishments. Since -- from the time they arrived, I never
- went there.
- 14 Q. [10:16:13] Mr Witness, do you also confirm that you cannot read?
- 15 A. [10:16:33] I'm sorry?
- 16 Q. [10:16:35] Mr Witness, are you able to read?
- 17 A. [10:16:51] I am not able to read.
- 18 Q. [10:16:55] Mr Witness, can I ask you if you've been following these proceedings?
- 19 A. [10:17:36] Did you not understand what I said? I said I was never in any of the
- 20 places where they do a trial, never.
- 21 Q. [10:17:56] Forgive me, Mr Witness. I was asking if you were following what
- 22 was happening in these proceedings on television, for example, or through local
- 23 gossip?
- 24 A. [10:18:42] I haven't seen this on the television. I haven't heard people talking
- about this.

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- 1 Q. [10:18:58] Thank you. So yesterday in the real-time transcript, the reference is
- 2 transcript 68, page 72, lines 17 to 24. And in case anything has been edited, the
- 3 timestamp is 14:36:10.
- 4 Mr Witness, yesterday you stated:
- 5 "They once found a woman who was sitting with us and they arrested her and took
- 6 her away. She had just come to visit us and she was not dressed correctly."
- 7 You were then asked by the Prosecutor: "And who arrested her?"
- 8 And you answered: "It was one of these people who arrested her, one of them who
- 9 was known as Hamed Moussa. He was the person who arrested her."
- 10 A. [10:20:55] The girl was not sitting with us. She was being chased. She came
- 11 towards us and that's when Hamed Moussa came to take her, when she was near us.
- 12 Q. [10:21:10] Mr Witness, is this the same incident that you described to the
- 13 Prosecution in your interview with them in 2019?
- 14 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:21:55](Interpretation) Madam Prosecutor.
- 15 THE INTERPRETER: [10:22:02] Please could the Prosecutor be asked to remove her
- 16 mask.
- 17 MS HUCK: [10:22:07](Interpretation) To be clearer for the witness, please could the
- Defence be asked to read the extract that she's referring to.
- 19 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:22:17](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland.
- 20 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:22:22] In -- I'm following proper procedure by establishing
- 21 whether he remembers. And I have it coming. There's no need to interrupt right
- 22 now.
- 23 And I would -- I think in case the message hasn't been delivered to my learned friend
- 24 for the Prosecution, the interpreters are asking that she remove her mask when
- 25 speaking.

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- 1 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:22:51](Interpretation) Very well. In that case,
- 2 please proceed.
- 3 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:22:55]
- 4 Q. [10:22:56] Mr Witness, is this the same incident that you described to the
- 5 Prosecution in your interview in 2019?
- 6 A. [10:23:35] Yes, this is the same thing.
- 7 Q. [10:23:38] And do you claim that you recognised Hamed Moussa at the time?
- 8 A. [10:23:57] Hamed Moussa, yes, that was him.
- 9 Q. [10:24:06] Would you agree that your memory of events was better in 2019 or
- 10 now?
- 11 A. [10:24:24] I'm sorry?
- 12 Q. [10:24:35] Was your memory -- was your memory of events better closer to the
- 13 time or now?
- 14 A. [10:25:05] Are you saying my memories of the things today, or what?
- 15 Q. [10:25:17] Mr Witness, I'm asking if your memory of events is better closer to the
- 16 time that they occurred or today?
- 17 A. [10:25:56] The things -- well, I recall what happened.
- 18 Q. [10:26:04] Okay. So turning to OTP tab 1, and document number is
- 19 MLI-OTP-0070-1598-R02 at 1605, and the paragraph number is 37.
- 20 This is originally in the French so I would ask that the interpreters read directly from
- 21 that, but I will read my translation in English.
- 22 THE SONGHAÏ INTERPRETER: [10:27:04](Interpretation) Message from the
- 23 Songhaï cabin: Just to point out that we do not have this document.
- 24 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:27:16](Interpretation) Court officer, they don't
- 25 have the documents there in the field, do they?

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- 1 Thank you very much for this proposal.
- 2 Ms Sutherland, please read in the English and our interpreter will read the text as it is
- 3 in French.
- 4 THE COURT OFFICER: (Interpretation) In the meantime, I have had confirmation
- 5 that the document will be sent to the field.
- 6 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: Thank you, courtroom officer.
- 7 Ms Sutherland.
- 8 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:27:58] The paragraph 37 reads:
- 9 (Redacted)
- 10 (Redacted). We asked her what was going on. She said she was
- on the street next to us and they were asking her why she was not well covered.
- 12 Quickly, I saw a white tarpaulin-covered 4x4 van arriving, without a plate, which
- 13 stopped. Two criminals got out to arrest the woman. They didn't say anything.
- 14 They pulled the woman away and she shouted "Help." We didn't say anything.
- 15 What could we have done? The woman struggled, but pulling her, they put her in
- 16 the cabin of the vehicle. She found herself sitting between them at the front of the
- 17 4x4. They took her in the direction of Yobou Tao. I did not know her. I did not
- 18 know the two men. In any case, I could not have recognised them, they were
- 19 masked. They were of medium height in yellow boubous. One of the two was
- 20 armed. They weren't wearing the waistcoat I described earlier. It was long after
- 21 the groups arrived in Timbuktu."
- 22 And Mr --
- 23 A. [10:31:59] That is exactly how it happened as recorded. But we must also
- 24 understand that these people had different roles. Each individual had a specific role.
- 25 When it comes to attire, it is Hamed Moussa who handled the cases of women

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- 1 who -- whose bodies were not entirely covered by their garments. That's how it was
- 2 organised.
- 3 Q. [10:32:34] Mr Witness, if I can within the same document refer you to page 1609
- 4 and that's paragraph 55. And in English that reads:
- 5 "The investigators asked me if I knew a person by the name of Mohamed Moussa. I
- 6 just know that among the criminals, one of them was called Hamed Moussa. I don't
- 7 know who he worked for. I've heard of him but I don't know him. I don't think
- 8 I've seen them. People said he was arresting unveiled women. He had a mosque in
- 9 Hammabangou, which was destroyed when the perpetrators left."
- 10 A. [10:34:51] Yes, that is what I said.
- 11 Q. [10:34:56] So, Mr Witness, you confirm that when you were interviewed by the
- 12 Prosecution in 2009 (sic), you did not know who Hamed Moussa worked for; is that
- 13 correct?
- 14 A. [10:35:45] I did not know that before. I did not know that he was working for
- 15 those people. It is only later. It's now that I know that he was working for those
- 16 people.
- 17 Q. [10:36:02] You said that people said he was arresting unveiled women. Who
- 18 were these people?
- 19 A. [10:36:36] I'm referring to the people of Timbuktu, men, women and children,
- 20 people of Timbuktu.
- 21 Q. [10:36:57] Mr Witness, are you telling us that your understanding of events has
- 22 changed since you spoke to the Prosecution in 2019?
- 23 A. [10:37:39] Yes.
- 24 Q. [10:37:44] How has it changed? Why?
- 25 A. [10:38:02] What change are you talking about?

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- 1 Q. [10:38:09] I asked you if you agreed that your understanding of events has
- 2 changed since you were interviewed by the Prosecution in 2019, and you agreed.
- 3 I'm referring to that change.
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:38:50](Interpretation) Mr Prosecutor.
- 5 MR DUTERTRE: [10:38:52](Interpretation) Yes, Mr President, the first point is that
- 6 questions have to be simple. Second, the question is quite general and vague when
- 7 it makes reference to understanding of events. What is being referred to specifically?
- 8 I think for reasons of fairness, the Defence should be more specific in their question.
- 9 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:39:26](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland, it is true
- 10 that the question might be too broad for the witness when you refer to a change in
- 11 understanding. So could you please be more specific.
- 12 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:39:50] Mr President, that's all -- I note all of that and I will
- 13 do so.
- 14 But in the -- in the interim, would it be -- could we have your leave to allow
- 15 Mr Al Hassan a short break from the courtroom?
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:40:18](Interpretation) Granted. He can leave
- 17 the courtroom for a few minutes.
- 18 We will suspend the session for a few moments.
- 19 (Pause in proceedings)
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:42:38](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland, I believe
- 21 we can proceed now.
- 22 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:42:44] Mr President, I believe -- ah, Mr Nsita is returning.
- 23 Q. [10:43:05] Mr Witness, in 2019 you've agreed that you did not know
- 24 Hamed -- who Hamed Moussa worked for.
- 25 You also told us -- told the Prosecution in 2009 (sic):

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- 1 "I've heard of him but don't know him. I don't think I've seen him."
- 2 And just now, and the transcript reference is 69, page 21, lines 6 to 12, you stated:
- 3 "I did not know that before. I did not know that he was working for those people.
- 4 It is only later. It's now that I know [...] he was working for those people."
- 5 I asked you: "You said that people said he was arresting unveiled women. Who
- 6 were these people?"
- 7 And you said: "I'm referring to the people of Timbuktu, men, women and children,
- 8 people of Timbuktu."
- 9 A. [10:45:17] Yes.
- 10 Q. [10:45:19] Do you agree that your understanding of Hamed Moussa's role has
- 11 changed since 2019?
- 12 A. [10:46:23] Hamed Moussa's job is what I told you. And that job didn't change
- 13 until they left the town. He was the one who took care of those cases until they left
- 14 the city.
- 15 Q. [10:46:40] When did you learn this?
- 16 A. [10:47:15] What I said happened a long time ago, from the time they entered
- 17 Timbuktu. That was his role from the very time they got into the city of Timbuktu
- and until they left. That was the role he played from the time they came -- they
- 19 arrived in Timbuktu.
- Q. [10:47:42] In 2019 you said, "I don't know who he worked for", and now you're
- 21 saying that this was the role he had the whole time. When did you learn that this
- 22 was his role?
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:48:06](Interpretation) Mr Prosecutor.
- 24 MR DUTERTRE: [10:48:07](Interpretation) The question has been asked and
- 25 answered. The witness has provided the answer he has. And I think that we can

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- 1 move on to another topic now.
- 2 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:48:18] I disagree that the witness has provided an answer.
- 3 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:48:27] I was waiting for the interpretation for
- 4 you.
- 5 (Interpretation) I really do not agree with you because -- I agree with Ms Sutherland
- 6 because she has asked a question about what he knew and now she wants to find out
- 7 since when he has -- he became aware of these things and how his understanding
- 8 may have changed. That's the difference.
- 9 So, Ms Sutherland, please proceed. Try to clarify and let's see where we go from
- 10 here.
- 11 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:49:14]
- 12 Q. [10:49:15] Mr Witness, are you able to tell us exactly when you learnt the
- 13 information that you've given us, that Mohamed Moussa was -- had the role that you
- 14 have -- sorry, I'll rephrase.
- 15 You told the Prosecution one thing in 2019 and you told us something different
- 16 yesterday. When did you learn that Hamed Moussa was present at that event?
- 17 A. [10:51:07] What I wanted to say is that that exact -- that was Hamed Moussa's
- 18 job. Since they arrived in Timbuktu, he was the one in charge of the cases of people
- 19 who were poorly attired or dressed. And everybody was aware of that, everybody
- 20 knew that.
- 21 (Redacted)
- 22 and the real-time transcript reference is transcript 68, page 85, lines 19 to 21.
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:52:05](Interpretation) Madam Prosecutor.
- 24 MS HUCK: [10:52:09](Interpretation) I am sorry, Mr President, but the information
- 25 relating to that period was given in private session yesterday.

- disseminated to the public and of course to the witness. And for that reason,
- 11 I would ask if we could identify a more neutral term to be used.
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:36:43](Interpretation) This expression malfaiteur
- 13 was used to designate whom in particular?
- 14 MS SUTHERLAND: [11:36:52] Both the Defence and the armed groups.
- 15 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:37:00](Interpretation) Thank you,
- 16 Ms Sutherland.
- 17 Obviously this is a very serious problem because, as we are all aware, any accused is
- presumed innocent until a regularly constituted court has gone through the
- 19 procedure and has reached the decision of guilt. Therefore, this Chamber cannot
- 20 tolerate the use of such an expression, we are very much opposed to it, and a neutral
- 21 term should be used.
- 22 I would draw the attention to interpreters who have used this expression I hadn't
- 23 actually heard it not to use it again and to use a more appropriate term. Of course,
- 24 in the witness statement the term *malfaiteur* is used. That's been used by the witness.
- 25 It's his opinion. That cannot be the opinion of the party, the participants or the

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- 1 interpreters. We absolutely wish to ensure that this does not happen in the future.
- 2 So I think everyone is now aware, Ms Sutherland, and you can proceed.
- 3 MS SUTHERLAND: [11:38:56] Thank you, Mr President.
- 4 Q. [11:39:01] Mr Witness -- sorry, the witness is still not connected, I believe.
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:39:11](Interpretation) Court officer, if you could

- 22 paragraph and we can hear the English translation. I don't want to get anything
- 23 inaccurate.
- 24 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:41:18](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland, is that
- 25 your opinion, you want the French booth to read the text?

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- 1 MS SUTHERLAND: [11:41:27] With your leave, Mr President.
- 2 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:41:33](Interpretation) Please go ahead and try
- 3 and keep pauses for our Songhaï friends.
- 4 THE FRENCH INTERPRETER: (No interpretation)
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:42:09](Interpretation) Mr Prosecutor.
- 6 MR DUTERTRE: [11:42:10](Interpretation) In this paragraph there is an element that
- 7 might be identifying. If you count from the bottom, the fourth line from the bottom.
- 8 I would just like to draw the Court's attention to that.
- 9 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:42:36](Interpretation) In that case we will read
- 10 this paragraph in private session.
- 11 Private session, please, court officer.
- 12 (Private session at 11.42 a.m.)
- 13 THE COURT OFFICER: [11:42:51](Interpretation) We are in private session, your
- 14 Honours.
