- 13 Please be seated.
- 14 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:00:50](Interpretation) The hearing will now
- 15 resume. Good morning to everybody.
- 16 Court officer, please call the case.
- 17 THE COURT OFFICER: [10:01:01] Good morning, Mr President, your Honours.
- 18 This is the situation in the Republic of Mali, in the case of The Prosecutor versus
- 19 Al Hassan Ag Abdoul Aziz Ag Mohamed Ag Mahmoud, case number
- 20 ICC-01/12-01/18.
- 21 And for the record, we're in open session.
- 22 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:01:23](Interpretation) Thank you very much,
- 23 court officer.
- We were due to start at 9.30. Unfortunately, for technical reasons out with the
- 25 control of the Chamber, we have been unable to start until now. We apologise for

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- 1 this delay.
- 2 As we are starting late, we will be considerably changing today's programme. We
- 3 will now meet from now until 11.30. There will then be a half-hour break, with our
- 4 second session starting at 12 and running until 13.30. We will then have our lunch
- 5 break -- a one-hour lunch break today, and our third session will therefore start at
- 6 14.30, and we will meet until 16.00, 4 o'clock, as usual. There we are.
- 7 So let us now start with the presentation, starting with the Prosecutor.
- 8 MS SARDACHTI: [10:02:57](Interpretation) Good morning, your Honours. For the
- 9 Prosecutor we have, as yesterday, my colleague Dianne Luping and myself,
- 10 Marie-Jeanne Sardachti.
- 11 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:03:07](Interpretation) Thank you very much,
- 12 Madam Prosecutor.
- 13 Defence.
- 14 MS SUTHERLAND: [10:03:10] Good morning, Mr President, your Honours. For
- 15 the Defence today we have Ms Melinda Taylor, Ms Sarah Marinier-Doucet,
- 16 Ms Sophia Westen and myself, Kirsty Sutherland.
- 17 And forgive me, Mr President, I know this is a slightly awkward time to raise this, but
- 18 it's also the entirely pertinent time. We understand that yesterday the same term
- 19 was used in Songhai that means -- translates as *malfaiteur*, or criminal, to refer to both
- 20 the Defence and Mr Al Hassan, and ask again if a more neutral term can be found. I
- 21 also understand that Songhai is a very rich language and that it's very plausible that a
- 22 suitable alternative can be used.
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:04:06](Interpretation) Thank you, Ms Sutherland,
- 24 for drawing our attention to this matter.
- 25 Speaking to the interpreters, as Maître Sutherland has said, we must not use the term

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- 1 of malfaiteur.
- 2 I turn now to Legal Representatives for Victims.
- 3 MR KASSONGO: [10:04:31](Interpretation) Thank you, your Honour. Good
- 4 morning, everybody. The format of the Legal Representative for Victims team has
- 5 not changed. I am here again on my own, Maître Kassongo, for the legal
- 6 representation of victims.
- 7 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:04:53](Interpretation) Thank you,
- 8 Maître Kassongo.
- 9 So I now turn to our witness. We will continue this morning hearing the 34th
- 10 Prosecution witness, P-0602.
- 11 Madam Witness, can you hear me -- good morning. Can you hear me?
- 12 WITNESS: MLI-OTP-P-0602 (On former oath)
- 13 (The witness speaks Songhai)
- 14 (The witness gives evidence via video link)
- 15 THE WITNESS: [10:05:26](Interpretation) Good morning to you. I can hear you
- 16 well.
- 17 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:05:30](Interpretation) Thank you very much,
- 18 Madam Witness.
- 19 Welcome once more to the court, and I would like to remind you that you are still
- 20 under oath.
- 21 THE WITNESS: [10:05:54](Interpretation) Yes, I have understood.
- 22 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:05:56](Interpretation) Therefore, you need to
- 23 speak the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth.
- 24 THE WITNESS: [10:06:09](Interpretation) Understood.
- 25 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:06:13](Interpretation) I would like to remind you

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1 that what you say is noted by court reporters and translated into several languages by

- 2 our interpreters.
- 3 THE WITNESS: [10:06:38](Interpretation) I have understood that, yes.
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:06:41](Interpretation) Therefore, I would ask you
- 5 to speak clearly and slowly in a moderated tone in order to take the work of the
- 6 interpreters easier.
- 7 THE WITNESS: [10:07:05](Interpretation) Yes, I've understood.
- 8 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [10:07:09](Interpretation) Thank you very much,
- 9 Madam Witness.
- 10 Madam Prosecutor, you have the floor, but yesterday I noted that in her replies our
- 11 witness tends to develop her replies and the interpreters tend to summarise. Could
- 12 you please try and ask questions so that the witness can ask -- can answer in short
- 13 chunks. Thank you.
- 14 Please go ahead.
- 15 MS SARDACHTI: [10:07:47](Interpretation) Yes, I've noted that, Mr President.
- 16 Thank you.
- 17 QUESTIONED BY MS SARDACHTI: (Continuing)(Interpretation)

- 20 Q. [10:08:07] I'm going to continue to ask you questions on behalf of the Office of
- 21 the Prosecutor.

- 23 Q. [10:08:24] I would like to come back to what Judge Mindua has just said. In
- order to allow us to note everything that you say, it's very important to have breaks in
- 25 what you say. And I myself will try hard to word my questions accordingly.

- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:06:23](Interpretation) Thank you, court officer.
- 24 Madam Prosecutor.
- 25 MS SARDACHTI: (Interpretation)

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- 1 Q. [11:06:39] Madam Witness, you said, when we were in private session, "I said I
- 2 wasn't interested because that doesn't concern me." Could you please tell us why
- 3 you say that that didn't concern you?
- 4 A. [11:07:31] I said that because something I didn't like, it didn't please me, and so I
- 5 didn't show interest in that because, yes, it just -- was just something that was going
- 6 to happen.
- 7 Q. [11:07:59] You talked about a religious ceremony. Was there any wedding
- 8 party?
- 9 A. [11:08:20] No, no, there was no party. No party. Nothing.
- 10 Q. [11:08:44] And before the armed groups arrived in Timbuktu, how -- what
- 11 happened when there was a marriage?
- 12 A. [11:09:09] Before they arrived in Timbuktu, there would be the religious
- marriage ceremony, there would be a party, there was a cortège. We were to
- transport the bride in a parade, in a cortège, and all that sort of thing.
- 15 Q. [11:09:40] So once what you describe as the marriage took place, how did you
- 16 feel?
- 17 A. [11:10:16] Once that happened, I really felt bad about it. I had grave concerns
- 18 about it.
- 19 Q. [11:10:36] What were your concerns?
- 20 A. [11:10:51] And then, well, these people come from nowhere and they come to
- 21 Timbuktu and they marry people just like that. They married lots of people. And
- 22 there are people who do bad things. Coming to us, marrying us in Timbuktu, that's
- what was so bad.
- 24 Q. [11:11:54] After your marriage, what happened?
- 25 A. [11:12:19] The marriage took place and they came. He took me at night, he

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- took me in a vehicle, so I spent the night with me (sic), and then he brought me home
- 2 the next day so that I would spend the day at my home.
- 3 Q. [11:13:02] So the day after the marriage, can you tell us exactly what happened?
- 4 A. [11:13:39] As I said, the marriage took place and I didn't go anywhere. I didn't
- 5 go anywhere in the neighbourhood. People come -- friends came and talked to me.
- 6 That's all.
- 7 Q. [11:14:09] You said, "He came and he took me for the night". Who came and
- 8 took you?
- 9 A. [11:14:33] That was the man to whom I had to be married. He came with one
- of his friends. They were the ones who came and took me.
- 11 Q. [11:14:54] Do you know their names?
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:15:04](Interpretation) Madam Prosecutor, there
- is a risk that the name might be spoken.
- 14 MS SARDACHTI: [11:15:10](Interpretation) As it's the names of the members of the
- 15 groups, I think I'm okay asking this question.
- 16 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:15:23](Interpretation) I don't know. Maybe it
- 17 would be better not to mention the names, or perhaps you could ask in private
- 18 session later.
- 19 MS SARDACHTI: [11:15:33](Interpretation) I have made a note of that,
- 20 your Honour.
- 21 Q. [11:15:53] Can you tell us where they took you?
- 22 A. [11:15:58] Yes, it was the house that was near (Redacted), that's where they
- 23 took me. And then they brought me home in the morning where I would spend the
- 24 day.
- 25 Q. [11:16:42] When they came to get you, were these two people armed?

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- 1 A. [11:16:57] Yes.
- 2 Q. [11:17:06] How were they dressed?
- 3 A. [11:17:21] They wore the same clothes they usually wore, as I explained to you
- 4 earlier.
- 5 Q. [11:17:42] You said that they -- they took you. What means of transport did
- 6 they use to take you away?
- 7 A. [11:18:02] I didn't understand. When they took me where?
- 8 Q. [11:18:21] You said, Madam Witness, that they took you away in a vehicle.
- 9 What sort of vehicle was this?
- 10 A. [11:18:44] The vehicle was the same vehicle I talked to you about, I spoke to you
- 11 about.
- 12 Q. [11:19:00] I'm sorry to have to ask you to repeat things, but just so that we have
- this clear, could you please describe the vehicle. What sort of vehicle was it, what
- 14 sort of colour?
- 15 A. [11:19:35] The -- there are no other signs, it's a sort of yellow colour where you
- can have three people in the front and the back is uncovered. The cruisers.
- 17 Q. [11:20:15] Would you have been able to escape?
- 18 A. [11:20:47] They knew that if I had the chance, I would have escaped, which is
- 19 why they put me between them, and that's -- for that reason I was unable to escape.
- 20 Q. [11:21:20] You said to us that you were taken to a house.
- 21 A. [11:21:32] Yes.
- 22 Q. [11:21:34] Can you describe this house, the colour and so on?
- A. [11:22:00] It was a house, a villa, and they were houses that had been abandoned.
- 24 Because when these people came in, the houses were abandoned when people fled.
- 25 Q. [11:22:24] And what was this house like?

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- 1 A. [11:22:47] It was a big house, somebody's house, a big house with different
- 2 rooms.
- 3 Q. [11:23:03] Had you ever seen this house before?
- 4 A. [11:23:19] It was a house I had seen when passing, but I had never been inside
- 5 before.
- 6 Q. [11:23:44] Who had you seen in this house?
- 7 A. [11:23:59] I don't understand. Do you mean when there were the real owners
- 8 or when these people had taken it over?
- 9 Q. [11:24:10] When you arrived in the house yourself, was there anybody else in
- 10 the house?
- 11 A. [11:24:42] It's possible, it's possible when you go in that other
- 12 people come and see it because there's a lot of rooms there. But, well, maybe some
- people might have been there, but I don't know, I don't know.
- 14 Q. [11:25:09] Apart from the two people that took you there, were there other
- 15 members of the armed groups there?
- 16 A. [11:25:37] It's possible, but I said when I arrived that there was nobody else -- I
- 17 didn't see anybody else. Sorry.
- 18 Q. [11:25:59] What did you do when you were in this house?
- 19 A. [11:26:15] What do you mean what did I do?
- 20 Q. [11:26:19] Did you have anything to do? Did anybody ask you to do anything?
- 21 A. [11:26:43] Yes. As I said, I just came there to spend the night, and then the next
- 22 day I left and he would leave too.
- 23 Q. [11:27:03] And were you able to leave this house?
- 24 A. [11:27:18] To go where?
- 25 Q. [11:27:23] Did you try and escape when you were in this house?

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- 1 A. [11:27:50] The -- the marriage had taken place, that was (inaudible) and I didn't
- 2 like it, I didn't like it. But I was afraid and I was concerns -- I had concerns because
- 3 I was afraid, and I was also afraid for my parents. And that was what was in my
- 4 head, I was afraid for my parents.
- 5 Q. [11:28:24] And why were you afraid for your parents?
- 6 A. [11:28:50] I was afraid because these were people who were not afraid of God,
- 7 so everybody in the whole town, they could have made problems.
- 8 Q. [11:29:09] What type of problems?
- 9 A. [11:29:31] They can accuse them and they could have said that they would have
- been the ones to help me escape, and I was afraid that that would happen if I left, that
- 11 they could say all of that.
- 12 MS SARDACHTI: [11:29:49] I see that it is almost 11.30. I think that perhaps we
- 13 could make the break now.
- 14 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [11:29:58](Interpretation) Indeed, yes, we're one
- minute before 11.30. So we will stop now. We will take half an hour's break and
- we will start again at 12.
- 17 The hearing is suspended.
- 18 THE COURT USHER: [11:30:14] All rise.
- 19 (Recess taken at 11.30 a.m.)
- 20 (Upon resuming in open session at 12.00 p.m.)
- 21 THE COURT USHER: [12:00:55] All rise.
- 22 Please be seated.
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:01:18](Interpretation) Court is in session once
- 24 again.
- 25 Courtroom officer, could you please tell us how much time the Office of the

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- 1 Prosecutor has already used up and how much time is remaining, if possible, please.
- 2 THE COURT OFFICER: [12:01:48] Your Honour, the Prosecution has used 2 hours
- 3 and 43 minutes in total, and today it used 1 hour and 21 minutes for questioning. I
- 4 will revert to you with regards to how much time they have remaining.
- 5 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:02:13](Interpretation) Very well.
- 6 Madam Prosecutor, over to you. You've heard what the courtroom officer just said.
- 7 So at the very most, you have five hours in total. There we are. Please go ahead.
- 8 MS SARDACHTI: [12:02:30](Interpretation) That's noted, Mr President.
- 9 Q. [12:02:36] Madam Witness, I would now like to home in on what happened on
- 10 the first night in the house. Once you arrived at the house, where did you go?
- 11 A. [12:03:24] We went into a room.
- 12 Q. [12:03:32] And what was that room like?
- 13 A. [12:03:49] It was a room where there was a double mattress.
- 14 Q. [12:04:02] And how big was this bedroom?
- 15 A. [12:04:16] Well, yes, it was just a room but not -- it was quite big, but not as big
- 16 as all that.
- 17 Q. [12:04:24] And what was the lighting like in the room?
- 18 A. [12:04:38] I beg your pardon?
- 19 Q. [12:04:42] Was there any light in the room?
- 20 A. [12:05:00] Yes, there was light in the room.
- 21 Q. [12:05:09] When you say "we went into the room", who went into the room?
- 22 A. [12:05:32] The gentleman that the marriage was conducted with, it was he.
- 23 Q. [12:05:45] And what happened that first night in the house in the room?
- 24 A. [12:06:06] Yes, on the first night, nothing happened in the room. Something
- 25 nearly happened, but I didn't accept.

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- 1 Q. [12:06:29] Did he speak to you?
- 2 A. [12:06:48] No, he just wanted to get close to me and touch me. There we are.
- 3 He was just sidling up to me.
- 4 Q. [12:07:09] And why do you say that something nearly happened?
- 5 A. [12:07:35] Well, it means that he wanted us to have intercourse. That's what he
- 6 wanted.
- 7 Q. [12:07:52] You say that you didn't accept. Can you explain that to us.
- 8 A. [12:08:06] I didn't accept because it was something that I didn't like. I didn't
- 9 accept. That's all.
- 10 Q. [12:08:34] You say that "He wanted us to have intercourse together." What
- 11 kind of intercourse or relations are you talking about?
- 12 A. [12:09:12] Well, I don't know how to say that to you, just wanted us to sleep
- together, for us to sleep together.
- 14 Q. [12:09:39] You said, "He was just trying to get close to me and touch me." Did
- 15 he touch you?
- 16 A. [12:10:04] The first night he didn't touch me because I refused.
- 17 Q. [12:10:16] Now, I know that this happened a long time ago and that it's difficult
- to recall, but can you remember what you said to him?
- 19 A. [12:10:48] What do you mean he said something to me?
- 20 Q. [12:10:52] You say "I refused." Well, after you refused, did he say something to
- 21 you?
- 22 A. [12:11:20] Yes, he just told me that if a man and woman get married, that they
- 23 should be aware that they should touch and that they should sleep together and that
- 24 they should do everything together.
- 25 Q. [12:11:42] And what did you answer?

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- 1 A. [12:11:54] Well, I didn't answer. I didn't even answer. I didn't even speak to
- 2 him.
- 3 Q. [12:12:14] So how did he understand that you had refused -- or I shall rephrase.
- 4 How did you express your refusal?
- 5 A. [12:12:40] Yes, he understood because I went to sit to one side, and he
- 6 understood that I didn't want to.
- 7 Q. [12:12:53] Was he armed that night?
- 8 A. [12:13:08] He put the rifle next door or nearby.
- 9 THE INTERPRETER: [12:13:16] Unclear in French.
- 10 MS SARDACHTI: [12:13:25](Interpretation)
- 11 Q. [12:13:26] When you say "next door or nearby", do you mean in the room?
- 12 A. [12:13:41] Yes, I mean next to him in the room.
- 13 Q. [12:13:53] And on that night, were you able to sleep?
- 14 A. [12:14:06] No, I wasn't able to sleep that night. I felt -- I spent the whole night
- 15 sitting down. I wasn't able to sleep.
- 16 Q. [12:14:28] Why were you not able to sleep?
- 17 A. [12:14:50] I couldn't sleep. I could see that man near me and I could see the
- 18 weapon. And the truth be told, I couldn't sleep.
- 19 Q. [12:15:06] What happened the next day?
- 20 A. [12:15:24] The next day nothing happened, and the next day the same thing
- 21 happened again.
- Q. [12:15:43] Now, Madam Witness, at page 21, from lines 10 to 13, you told us that
- 23 "The marriage took place. He came and took me at night, he took me in a vehicle,
- 24 and I spent the night at his house. And on the next day he took me back."
- 25 A. [12:16:58] Yes.

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- 1 Q. [12:17:00] So did he take you home to your house that morning?
- 2 A. [12:17:14] Are you talking about our house?
- 3 Q. [12:17:23] On the next day, did you remain in the house or did he take you back
- 4 to your home?
- 5 A. [12:17:42] On that day, do you mean that day?
- 6 Q. [12:17:50] I do apologise. I might not have been very clear as to the temporal
- 7 framework. You describe to us that on a first night you were taken to the house.
- 8 Then you told us that you spent the first house in -- the first night in that house.
- 9 A. [12:18:31] Yes.
- 10 Q. [12:18:32] And that -- and so, the next morning where did you go?
- 11 A. [12:18:48] I went home. They took me home.
- 12 Q. [12:18:57] When you say "home", is that your father's house?
- 13 A. [12:19:06] Yes.
- 14 Q. [12:19:15] Do you remember who was present at the time?
- 15 A. [12:19:34] Yes, when they took me home, my parents were there. That's all.
- 16 Q. [12:19:45] Did you talk to them?
- 17 A. [12:20:02] Yes, we did speak. There are certain things that are not said, but we
- 18 did talk.
- 19 Q. [12:20:20] And what did you talk about?
- 20 A. [12:20:40] We just talked about things in life. I know that we talked.
- 21 Q. [12:20:55] Did you talk about what happened on that first night?
- 22 A. [12:21:14] We just talked. We didn't talk about that. We just talked.
- 23 Q. [12:21:27] Who took you back to your father's home that morning?
- 24 A. [12:21:44] It was the same man who took me to the house with his friend and
- 25 then they went back.

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- 1 Q. [12:22:00] And did they come back and pick you up again?
- 2 A. [12:22:17] Yes, that's what happened every night, they would come back. They
- 3 would come and go.
- 4 Q. [12:22:33] So if I have understood you correctly, did they come and pick you up
- 5 on the second night?
- 6 A. [12:22:49] Yes.
- 7 Q. [12:22:52] And what happened on that second night?
- 8 A. [12:23:13] The same thing happened on the second night that had happened on
- 9 the first night.
- 10 Q. [12:23:24] Just to clarify, when you say "he", who do you mean?
- 11 A. [12:23:47] Who do you mean?
- 12 Q. [12:23:50] Was it the same people who came to pick you up on that first night?
- 13 THE INTERPRETER: [12:24:01] Correction: "he" should be "they".
- 14 THE WITNESS: [12:24:07](Interpretation) Yes.
- 15 MS SARDACHTI: (Interpretation)
- 16 Q. [12:24:18] And when you say that this happened again on the second night,
- 17 what do you mean by that?
- 18 A. [12:24:44] Well, in the same way that I hadn't accepted on the first night, I didn't
- 19 accept on the second night.
- 20 Q. [12:24:58] What did you not accept?
- 21 A. [12:25:13] I did not accept that we sleep together, because that's what he asked
- 22 again.
- 23 Q. [12:25:33] You say "I did not accept that we sleep together." Can you tell us
- 24 what his reaction was?
- 25 THE INTERPRETER: [12:26:01] Message from the Songhai interpreters:

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1 Mr President, could you please ask the witness to repeat what she just said? Thank

- 2 you.
- 3 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:26:12](Interpretation) Yes.
- 4 Madam Witness, could you please repeat your answer.
- 5 THE WITNESS: [12:26:29](Interpretation) Which answer are you referring to?
- 6 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:26:34](Interpretation) Madam Prosecutor,
- 7 please.
- 8 MS SARDACHTI: (Interpretation)
- 9 Q. [12:26:37] You said "I did not accept that we sleep together." Can you tell us
- what the reaction of the man was to that after you had expressed your refusal?
- 11 A. [12:27:24] Well, he was very angry, very wound up. I was frightened, but I
- 12 didn't take that into account.
- 13 Q. [12:27:38] Did you try and run away?
- 14 A. [12:28:03] I had the idea of running away in my mind, but I couldn't do that
- because they knew where I came from. I thought about running, but I didn't do it.
- 16 Q. [12:28:23] And for things to be clear, are we talking here about the same man as
- 17 on the first night?
- 18 A. [12:28:42] Yes.
- 19 Q. [12:28:50] You said to us that he was very angry, very wound up. Could you
- 20 tell us more about that? Did he say anything? How did it unfold?
- 21 A. [12:29:24] Well, he didn't say anything particular to me, he just frightened me.
- 22 Q. [12:29:38] And on that second night, did he have his weapon?
- 23 A. [12:29:48] Yes, he did.
- Q. [12:30:03] Did you talk about the marriage on that night?
- 25 A. [12:30:16] No.

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- 1 Q. [12:30:30] You told us that he frightened you. How did he frighten you?
- 2 A. [12:30:52] He frightened me. He was shouting. He frightened me. And then
- 3 it was -- he had his rifle that he took in his hand and that all frightened me.
- 4 Q. [12:31:13] And that night, did you sleep well?
- 5 A. [12:31:28] No, that night I didn't sleep well. I kept waking up, just kept waking
- 6 up.
- 7 Q. [12:31:53] What happened on the next day?
- 8 A. [12:32:10] The next thing, he took me home to my father's house. That's all.
- 9 Q. [12:32:35] So on the day after this second night, did you talk about this to your
- 10 father?
- 11 A. [12:33:11] I couldn't say that to my father. These type of words, I can't say
- 12 them to my father. I just said that I hadn't slept for two nights and that was it. And
- 13 he told me -- I told him I was afraid, I was afraid, that's why I didn't sleep. And he
- 14 told me not to be afraid.
- 15 Q. [12:33:47] Did they come back and get you again?
- 16 A. [12:34:00] Yes, yes, that's -- that's what happened. They came and got me
- 17 again.
- 18 Q. [12:34:07] Who came and got you?
- 19 A. [12:34:18] The same ones who got me each time. They were the same.
- 20 Q. [12:34:30] Could you tell us again who they were?
- 21 A. [12:34:43] The man I talked to you about and his friend.
- 22 Q. [12:34:59] On this third night, where did they take you?
- 23 A. [12:35:10] They took me to the same house again.
- 24 Q. [12:35:23] And what happened then?
- 25 A. [12:35:46] On the third night it became forceful. He -- truth, he forced me.

- WITNESS: MLI-OTP-P-0602
- 1 And then, well, he -- he frightened me with a weapon.
- 2 Q. [12:36:20] How did he force you?
- 3 A. [12:36:33] He forced -- forced me. He forced me to sleep with him. He forced
- 4 me.
- 5 Q. [12:36:52] Madam Witness, I do realise that it's very difficult for you to talk
- 6 about this. Could you please explain what you mean by "sleep with me"?
- 7 A. [12:37:32] Sleep with me, well, what do you want me to say? Have relations.
- 8 What do you mean? What do you want me to say?
- 9 Q. [12:37:48] Maybe to talk about this sort of thing, which is very difficult, I could
- show you a diagram and ask you to circle the items on the diagram. Would that be
- 11 okay? I could ask the President if we can do this.
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:38:24](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland.
- 13 MS SUTHERLAND: [12:38:25] Mr President, if it assists, the Defence does not
- 14 dispute what "relations" means and we understand.
- 15 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:38:44](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland, we have
- 16 the impression that Madam Witness doesn't wish to use the appropriate terms, which
- is why the Prosecutor wants to use a diagram. But what -- could you make your
- 18 point clearer, Ms Sutherland.
- 19 MS SUTHERLAND: [12:39:05] Mr President, we're saying that the Defence
- 20 understands what the witness is indeed saying and what the terms she -- what the
- 21 terms she's using refer to. And in order to avoid any further traumatisation of her,
- 22 we're content to remain with the language already used.
- 23 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:39:31](Interpretation) Thank you for your
- 24 understanding, Ms Sutherland.
- 25 Are you happy with that, Madam Prosecutor?

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- 1 MS SARDACHTI: [12:39:39](Interpretation) We -- just to clarify this, is the Defence
- 2 saying that we don't need to go any further to clarify the fact that there were sexual
- 3 relations?
- 4 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:39:53](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland, are we all
- 5 agreed on the terminology? Because the Prosecutor wants to clarify that there was
- 6 penetration, but can we not have to put this to the witness, that we are all agreed that
- 7 that's what happened?
- 8 MS SUTHERLAND: [12:40:17] Yes, Mr President, we agree with the terminology.
- 9 We agree not necessarily that it happened, but that is what she means by the use
- 10 of that term.
- 11 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [12:40:37](Interpretation) Quite.
- 12 Madam Prosecutor, you can proceed.
- 13 MS SARDACHTI: [12:40:44](Interpretation) Thank you for the Defence -- thank you
- 14 to the Defence for that, because that's in accordance with the recommendations of the
- unit, Victim and Witness Unit, and so I will continue.
- 16 Q. [12:41:24] You said to us that he forced you with his weapon. Can you explain
- 17 how he forced you?
- 18 A. [12:41:49] How? What?
- 19 Q. [12:41:56] What did he do with his weapon?
- 20 A. [12:42:16] Well, he picked up his weapon and I was afraid, just picked it up and
- 21 I was afraid.
- 22 Q. [12:42:45] Did you say anything?
- 23 A. [12:43:03] I didn't say anything. I said nothing. No, I -- I was afraid. I just
- 24 didn't say anything.
- 25 Q. [12:43:15] I know it was a long time ago, but can you recall whether he said

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- 1 anything?
- 2 A. [12:43:52] I heard him say that we were married, we were married, and that's
- 3 what people who are married have to do. And I was supposed to know that.
- 4 Q. [12:44:23] And then what happened?
- 5 A. [12:44:46] He forced me to sleep with him and he forced me, forced me. And
- 6 once we slept together, I was afraid all night.
- 7 Q. [12:45:06] How did this make you feel inside?
- 8 A. [12:45:16] Well, it's something that happened that I didn't want. It was against
- 9 my will and -- really, and that -- I didn't like that. It made me feel bad.
- 10 Q. [12:45:53] And how did you feel in your heart?
- 11 A. [12:46:12] I felt that it was not right, in my heart.
- 12 Q. [12:46:36] What happened after these sexual relations?
- 13 A. [12:46:52] Nothing happened after that.
- 14 Q. [12:46:59] Did he take you home?
- 15 A. [12:47:09] Yes, that's what happened. That's what -- how it was. I would
- 16 come for the night and then the next morning I would be taken home.
- 17 Q. [12:47:37] Did you have sexual relations with him on the other nights?
- 18 A. [12:47:54] After the time that he frightened me, well, after that we slept together.
- 19 Q. [12:48:20] I know that this is all a long time ago, but could you tell us over how
- 20 many days this took place.
- 21 A. [12:49:05] Well, it was quite a few days, with comings and goings, and at a
- 22 certain time it stopped. There were two nights like that.
- 23 Q. [12:49:33] Madam Witness, could you please repeat your last answer because
- 24 there's a part that was not clear or not audible. Could you please repeat what you

25 last said.

- WITNESS: MLI-OTP-P-0602
- 1 A. [12:49:56] Which part?
- 2 Q. [12:50:04] I will ask my question again.
- 3 You said that "Since the time he frightened me, we were -- we slept together." So
- 4 after the time he frightened you, can you tell us how long this thing lasted?
- 5 A. [12:50:44] The comings and goings, what do you mean?
- 6 Q. [12:50:57] Perhaps I can put my question a different way.
- 7 How long do you think that your marriage lasted?
- 8 A. [12:51:41] Marriage lasted a little time. But when people started to escape,
- 9 when the escapes started and the Malian army came, then I didn't see anybody
- 10 anymore.
- 11 Q. [12:52:17] Did you get the impression that you had any choice in whether you
- 12 got married?
- 13 A. [12:52:43] Who would ask me that?
- 14 Q. [12:53:08] Did you feel that you were free in this marriage?
- 15 A. [12:53:24] How do you mean "free in this marriage"? I didn't -- I told you that I
- didn't agree to this marriage, but it took place, it happened.
- 17 Q. [12:53:55] How did this marriage end?
- 18 A. [12:54:18] As I said, when the people started fleeing and when people started to
- 19 flee and the aircraft hit from -- from the top and people hid, that was the moment.
- 20 Q. [12:54:43] Did you ever see him again?
- 21 A. [12:55:01] After the fleeing started, well, I don't know. I don't know
- 22 whether -- in the bombings, I don't know whether he was -- whether he's alive or
- 23 dead. I don't know.
- Q. [12:55:29] After the facts, did you ever return to that house?
- 25 A. [12:55:43] What would I go there for? No, no, I've never been back.

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- 1 Q. [12:55:57] After the forced sexual relations that you describe to us, did you
- 2 receive any medical treatment?
- 3 A. [12:56:28] Excuse me, whether I had medication?
- 4 Q. [12:56:36] Did you receive any medication? Did you go and see a doctor?
- 5 That sort of thing.
- 6 A. [12:57:08] I went to the hospital, where I got some medication, because I didn't
- 7 feel well in myself.
- 8 Q. [12:57:32] Did -- did you have any marks on your body after the forced sexual
- 9 relations?
- 10 A. [12:57:50] What do you mean by "marks"?
- 11 Q. [12:58:00] Marks, scars, that sort of thing.
- 12 A. [12:58:18] No.
- 13 Q. [12:58:26] Any injuries?
- 14 A. [12:58:39] No. No, no.
- 15 Q. [12:58:46] You said that "I didn't feel well in myself in my body." What do you
- 16 mean by that?
- 17 A. [12:59:11] So I felt that my body hurt and I -- that -- that's -- that's what I felt.
- 18 Q. [12:59:32] And did you have any help to feel better mentally?
- 19 A. [12:59:59] How --
- 20 THE INTERPRETER: [13:00:06] The beginning was inaudible, but -- the whole thing
- 21 was inaudible.
- 22 MS SARDACHTI: [13:00:14](Interpretation)
- 23 Q. [13:00:16] I'm going to put my question again because I see that the answer was
- 24 not able to be captured by the interpreters.
- 25 Did you have anything to make you feel better in your head after the events?

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- 1 A. [13:00:58] After that, I fell sick. And it was my father who went to see some
- 2 marabouts so that they could do something to me and help me to forget it all.
- 3 Q. [13:01:24] According to you, how long did the members of the armed groups
- 4 remain in Timbuktu?
- 5 A. [13:02:01] I do not recall, I do not recall how long they stayed.
- 6 Q. [13:02:22] What was your reaction when they left?
- 7 A. [13:03:05] Nothing happened. It's just that at the beginning, I didn't feel well,
- 8 I would withdraw. But my father went to see some marabouts for me, who prayed
- 9 for me, and then I was able to speak and talk to people again.
- 10 Q. [13:03:49] And from what you could observe, what was the reaction of the
- 11 population in Timbuktu when the armed groups left?
- 12 A. [13:04:21] Yes, the people in the town were very happy. Because men and
- women alike had been terrorised. So people were very happy.
- 14 Q. [13:04:54] I shall repeat what you said in the context of your testimony. From
- page 21, lines 4 to 8, you told us that you could see "people coming out of nowhere,
- 16 coming to Timbuktu, and coming to get married to people like that. They married
- 17 many people like that. And there are some people who do bad things. Coming to
- 18 get married to us in Timbuktu, that hurts."
- 19 A. [13:06:57] Yes, it is something that really did hurt us a great deal, and their
- 20 departure did us a great deal of good.
- 21 Q. [13:07:14] So I wanted to ask you whether you knew if this had happened to
- 22 other people.
- 23 A. [13:07:53] Yes, my sister has a friend by the name of (Redacted) who was also
- 24 married off, and we were in the habit of going by their house to greet them.
- 25 Q. [13:08:11] So, Madam Witness, I would rather we continue in open session, but

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- 1 I would remind you not to give any names. I should have reminded you of that
- 2 earlier. It's my fault. Please do not give any names. So refer to this individual as
- 3 your friend, if you don't mind.
- 4 So I will ask you for their name later in private session, but for the time being, we
- 5 shall be redacting the name.
- 6 So how are you aware for this friend of yours that she was married to one of the
- 7 members of the armed groups?
- 8 A. [13:10:03] I don't know how it happened, but it's not my friend, my own friend,
- 9 it's the elder sister of one of our friends.
- 10 Q. [13:10:21] So who spoke to you about her marriage?
- 11 A. (No interpretation)
- 12 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [13:10:44](Interpretation) Ms Sutherland.
- 13 MS SUTHERLAND: [13:10:45] My fear is that it's going to be very difficult to track
- 14 who's speaking about what if we continue in this manner. And may I therefore
- 15 suggest that we go briefly into private session to assign code names for the respective
- 16 individuals?
- 17 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [13:11:10](Interpretation) Thank you, Ms Sutherland,
- 18 for your idea. I think you're right.
- 19 So we shall go into private session, please, Mr Courtroom Officer.
- 20 (Private session at 1.11 p.m.)
- 21 THE COURT OFFICER: [13:11:34] We're in private session, Mr President.

- 10 A. [14:33:27] Okay.
- 11 Q. [14:33:30] This is a public video. We will show first an extract and then come
- back to certain particular points. Once I've played the passage from the video, I will
- 13 ask you whether you recognise anything.
- 14 The passage I'd like to play is from 00:27:12:00 to 00:27:57:00.
- 15 MS SARDACHTI: [14:34:51] (Interpretation) May I play it myself, Mr President? It
- will be on evidence channel 2.
- 17 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:35:00](Interpretation) Go ahead, Madam
- 18 Prosecutor.
- 19 (Viewing of the video excerpt)
- 20 MS SARDACHTI: [14:35:55] (Interpretation)
- 21 Q. [14:35:57] Madam Witness, were you able to see this extract from the video?
- 22 A. [14:36:06] Yes, I saw it.
- 23 Q. [14:36:10] Were you able to recognise anything, things, places, people?
- 24 A. [14:36:41] Yes, what I've just seen looks very like places I know very well, but
- 25 it's -- it's a while ago and it's really gone out of my head now.

- 1 Q. [14:37:02] I would like to show some precise moments from the video.
- 2 A. [14:37:19] Okay.
- 3 Q. [14:37:21] So timestamp 00:27 ...
- 4 (Viewing of the video excerpt)
- 5 MS SARDACHTI: [14:38:15](Interpretation) So I'd like to come to 00:27:26:20.
- 6 Q. [14:38:28] Can you tell us what you see on the screen now?
- 7 A. [14:38:44] Yes, I can see two people, two Islamists.
- 8 Q. [14:38:59] Can I draw your attention to their clothing.
- 9 A. [14:39:13] Yes.
- 10 Q. [14:39:16] Have you seen such garments previously?
- 11 A. [14:39:29] Yes, that's the clothes they wear, they wear clothes like that.
- 12 Q. [14:39:42] When you say "their clothes", who are "they", whose clothes?
- 13 A. [14:39:55] The -- the Islamists that you're -- that you're showing here.
- 14 Q. [14:40:16] So now I'd like to move to another timestamp. But before I do so,
- 15 I would like to ask you an additional question.
- 16 In fact, well, I come back to my question. When you say whose clothes, your answer
- is "the clothes that you showed me." And you said that you had already seen -- that
- 18 you had previously seen such clothing. So I know that these are repetitive questions,
- 19 but whose clothes are we talking about here?
- 20 A. [14:41:54] These are the sort of clothes that we were talking about before.
- 21 Q. [14:42:05] Did the people who came to your house wear this sort of clothing?
- 22 A. [14:42:21] Yes, yes, they did. That was the sort of clothes that they wore.
- 23 Q. [14:42:32] So now I would like to move to that other timestamp.
- 24 (Viewing of the video excerpt)
- 25 MS SARDACHTI: [14:43:26] I've stopped the video at 00:27:17:05.

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- 1 Q. [14:43:43] Can you tell us what you see on the screen now?
- 2 A. [14:44:08] What I can see is a vehicle, a white -- a Hilux white vehicle and on it
- 3 there is the flag of the Islamists. That's what I can see.
- 4 Q. [14:44:39] And have you seen this flag before?
- 5 A. [14:44:54] Yes, yes, I've seen it. I've seen it quite often. It was their flag. As
- 6 soon as you see the Islamists, you see the flag that looks like that.
- 7 Q. [14:45:21] Thank you, Madam Witness. Those are all the questions I have
- 8 related to this video.
- 9 And before completing the examination-in-chief by the Prosecution, I have a few
- 10 questions about the consequences that these events have had on you in your life.
- 11 Can you explain to the Chamber what impact these events have had on your life?
- 12 A. [14:46:59] Do you mean where I am now?
- 13 Q. [14:47:04] I will clarify my question.
- 14 What you went through, the forced sexual relations, the marriage you talked -- talked
- about, what effect has this had on your everyday life nowadays?
- 16 A. [14:48:03] Now I can say that it's okay, but I still feel this sadness in my heart.
- 17 Q. [14:48:20] Did this change your relationships with your family?
- 18 THE INTERPRETER: [14:48:46] Message from the Songhai booth: With your
- 19 authorisation, could Madam Witness please repeat her last answer.
- 20 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:49:00](Interpretation) Madam Prosecutor, could
- 21 you please ask the witness the same question again rather than have her repeat it.
- 22 MS SARDACHTI: [14:49:10] (Interpretation)
- 23 Q. [14:49:12] Has this changed the relationship between you and your family?
- 24 A. [14:49:29] No, that didn't change anything because they know that nobody
- could do anything about what happened.

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- 1 Q. [14:49:42] And with your friends, did anything change in your relationships
- 2 with them?
- 3 A. [14:49:58] No, no, nothing changed.
- 4 Q. [14:50:11] And how do you cope with all this on a day-to-day basis?
- 5 A. [14:50:31] How -- how to do this in my heart?
- 6 Q. [14:50:42] Yes, you talked about the pain in your heart, how -- how do you
- 7 manage this pain every day?
- 8 A. [14:51:09] As I said, it was my father who did what -- what was necessary so that
- 9 I would be more calm.
- 10 Q. [14:51:26] Thank you, Madam Witness. The Prosecution has finished its
- 11 questions for you. I would like to thank you for your courage and I turn now to the
- 12 President.
- 13 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:51:51](Interpretation) Thank you,
- 14 Madam Prosecutor. That is the end of the examination-in-chief?
- 15 Madam Prosecutor, can you confirm that this is the end of the examination-in-chief?
- 16 MS SARDACHTI: [14:52:08] (Interpretation) Yes. Clearly I wasn't specific enough.
- 17 That is the end of my examination-in-chief.
- 18 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:52:15](Interpretation) Thank you very much,
- 19 Madam Prosecutor.
- 20 I turn now to the Legal Representative of Victims. We have received your writings
- of 12 April, confidential writings that you have said that this is a direct witness but
- 22 who has not yet been declared a potential victim. You would have liked to ask
- 23 questions about the rape suffered, the forced marriage, and the consequences for the
- 24 person, the family and so on. These are legitimate questions which have also been
- 25 covered by the Prosecutor. But given the vulnerability of this witness, you know

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1 that you always get the opportunity to examine victims, but we would like to use our

- 2 discretionary power. We think there is no need to ask further questions on the
- 3 impact of the alleged suffering on the person and the family.
- 4 So in that case, we will move immediately to the Defence cross-examination.
- 5 Maître Kassongo, would you like to -- would you like to add something?
- 6 MR KASSONGO: [14:54:09](Interpretation) Thank you, your Honour, your Honours.
- 7 I would first like to say that I am very happy with the examination-in-chief and to
- 8 accept the decision of the Chamber for which I thank you.
- 9 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:54:31](Interpretation) Thank you, Maître
- 10 Kassongo, for your understanding.
- 11 I turn now to the Defence. Ms Sutherland, what is the position for your
- 12 cross-examination?
- 13 MS SUTHERLAND: [14:54:43] Mr President, we are of course ready to proceed, but
- 14 we actually would like to ask for an adjournment to tomorrow morning. The reason
- being, frankly, for me to speak very plainly, I feel very unwell. I've been suffering
- 16 from a migraine for the last two days. My hope is that by the morning I will be in a
- 17 better position to examine. This will have no bearing on the conclusion of the
- 18 hearing tomorrow.
- 19 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:55:24](Interpretation) Clearly, Ms Sutherland,
- 20 the Chamber understands that you have a migraine, but as you can imagine, our
- 21 programme is very heavily filled. You have an hour and five minutes. If you wish
- 22 not to take up this hour but only to work tomorrow, can you confirm that you will
- 23 finish tomorrow?
- 24 MS SUTHERLAND: [14:55:59] My understanding, Mr President, is that the
- 25 Prosecution will have, I think, used four -- roughly four hours today. Therefore, we

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- 1 would conclude our cross-examination within the same time tomorrow.
- 2 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:56:27](Interpretation) The Chamber -- before I
- 3 give you our decision, I see that Madam Prosecutor is on her feet.
- 4 MS SARDACHTI: [14:56:36] (Interpretation) I just wanted to point out that we have
- 5 no objection to adjourning to tomorrow. And we have noticed that the witness looks
- 6 also somewhat tired; therefore, that would seem to be a good thing.
- 7 PRESIDING JUDGE MINDUA: [14:56:53](Interpretation) You're right. I can see
- 8 that the witness is also -- seems very tired. So we can adjourn until tomorrow
- 9 morning.
- 10 Madam Witness, once again, I would like to say how grateful we are to you for your
- 11 cooperation. So we will stop now for today, but as you have noticed, your testimony
- 12 is not yet over. So we will meet again tomorrow morning at 9.30 in The Hague and
- 13 you will be told what time you should be there to continue your testimony.
- 14 In the meantime, please remember that you must not discuss your testimony with
- 15 anyone at all. You should not discuss it with members of your family or your
- 16 friends, if you are in contact with them this evening.
- 17 So on behalf of the judges of the Chamber I would ask you to take the opportunity to
- 18 rest this evening and I thank you for your courage.
- 19 So at this stage I would like to express my thanks to the parties and the participants,
- 20 the court reporters and interpreters, our security officers and our public.
- 21 We will now adjourn and we will meet again tomorrow morning at 9.30.
